Love Transcends Ages

Clyde F. Simon II, Bath, New York

When Henry Coil was a teenager in Elmira, N.Y. in the 1930s, he lived next door to Anna Campbell. They started dating – but World War II intervened.

Henry, now a resident of Clyde F. Simon II in Bath, N.Y., joined the Army National Guard and was shipped to the Pacific. Henry and Anna kept in touch, but she wrote to tell him that she had married another man, someone he knew. He was heartbroken. During the war, he began corresponding with a friend of Anna's from Elmira, Jane Tanner. They were married in 1945 a week after he returned stateside, and enjoyed a 62-year marriage.

"I had never forgotten her," he recalls, "even though I loved my wife." His daughter Connie scoured the internet looking for Anna, and located her with the

first phone call. Anna's husband had died nine years earlier. The two began to talk by telephone, recalling their lives, old friends, and long-ago events. They found they had a lot in common, including daily activities like music, television shows, and food.

After 60 years of being apart, Anna, 86, and Henry, 89, married in June 2008. "I couldn't tell you how many bullets went by me, the

shells that exploded, and fragments that went by," he comments. "I think the fellow upstairs is looking after us and is going to give us some time together."

Jane passed away November 2007, and Henry started wondering whatever happened to Anna.

EHDOC's 2009 Expansion Plans Include New Construction, New Management



EHDOC plans to expand its portfolio significantly in 2009 so that more low-income seniors can age with dignity and peace of mind in safe, secure, and affordable housing.

Palermo Lakes, a brand new 109-unit project in Miami, Fla., will be fully occupied in February 2009. Teamsters Residence, a 52-unit facility in Maumee, Ohio, is now an EHDOCmanaged property.

There are three additional EHDOC projects under development: Ed Romero Terrace, a new 42-unit property in Albuquerque, which will be EHDOC's first property in the state of

New Mexico. Richard J. Daley Apartments in Chicago, Ill., with 31 new units, will join Senate Apartmens, Prete Apartments and North Park Village Apartments, becoming the fourth property in EHDOC's Illinois portfolio. John Piazza Apartments in Fontana, Calif., with 60 units, will be adjacent to Dino Papavero, with 155 units. John Piazza Apartments will be EHDOC's fourth property in the state of California.
